SYPHILIS

Syphilis is a bacterial, sexually transmitted infection (STI). Syphilis is curable and progression of the disease is preventable, but if left untreated, it can cause cardiovascular and neurological diseases, blindness and can also be transmitted from a pregnant woman to her fetus.

Congenital Syphilis

is syphilis present in a pregnant mother's uterus and is acquired by her baby during birth. Women with untreated or inadequately treated early- or late-stage syphilis occurring within a year or more after infection face a 23 percent chance of an adverse pregnancy.

Untreated congenital syphilis can cause poor pregnancy outcomes, including miscarriages stillbirths or death in newborns. Some infants with congenital syphilis have symptoms at birth, but many develop symptoms later.
